

Rudolf Olgiati

Rudolf Olgiati (* 1910 in Chur; † 1995 in Flims) war ein Schweizer Architekt.

Leben

Rudolf Olgiati war Sohn des Rechtsanwalts Oreste Olgiati und Bürger von Poschiavo und Chur. 1927 erwarb er die Matura an der Kantonsschule Chur. Anschliessend studierte er an der Eidgenössischen Technischen Hochschule Zürich, wo er 1934 bei Prof. J. Zemp in Kunstgeschichte abschloss. Von 1935 bis 1937 folgte ein längerer Aufenthalt in Rom. Anschliessend war Rudolf Olgiati als Architekt tätig, zunächst in Zürich und ab 1944 in Flims, wo er bereits 1930 ein Haus aus dem Familienbesitz erworben und umgebaut hatte. Sein Sohn Valerio Olgiati ist ebenfalls als Architekt tätig und lebt heute in Flims im Haus seines Vaters.

Grundzüge seines Schaffens

Rudolf Olgiati war ein Vertreter der Neuen Sachlichkeit und einer der ersten, die Mitte der 1950er Jahre die Bedeutung und Wirksamkeit historischer Gestaltungsprinzipien für die Architektur der Moderne entdeckten. Er baute vorwiegend Einfamilienhäuser im gebirgigen Graubünden und restaurierte alte Patrizier- und Bauernhäuser, später auch Bauten in Südfrankreich und Deutschland.

Seine kubische Formensprache bewegte sich im Spannungsfeld zwischen lokaler Bündner Bautradition, der griechischen Antike und einer sich vor allem an Le Corbusier orientierenden Moderne. Er strebte damit ein universelles, zeitloses und radikal modernes Bauen an, welches gleichermaßen den Einfluss internationaler Architektur wie das Autochthone der Schweizer Architektur dokumentiert und sich dabei seiner ideologischen und formalen Bezüge stets bewusst ist. Bei Olgiati, der den Rückgriff auf traditionelle Elemente niemals als restaurativ verstanden wissen wollte, vereinigt sich die Architektur mit lokaler Tradition und mit dem Ort als solchem, den er durch die Herstellung einer intimen Beziehung zwischen Architektur und der ansässigen Gesellschaft neu zu "schaffen" beanspruchte.

Seine Arbeiten wurden 1977 von der ETH Zürich, 1986 in der Freien Akademie der Künste in Hamburg, 1986 an der Technischen Universität Berlin und 1988 an der Kunstuniversität Linz ausgestellt. 1981 erhält er den Kulturpreis des Kantons Graubünden. 1988 entstand ein Dokumentarfilm über Rudolf Olgiati, der überdies mit streitbaren Thesen immer wieder in die Architekturdebatte eingriff. Breite Aufmerksamkeit fand etwa sein Kommentar "Unwissende Kitschbrüder zerstören unsere Heimat"^[1] zum neuen Erscheinungsbild des nach seiner Ansicht "zu Tode renovierten" Arcas-Platzes in Chur.^{[2] [3]}
